A Mill for Prosperity!

Thanks to the wonderful generosity of Riannon & Jeremy Zorn, the women's cooperative of Munene village (near Uvira, S. Kivu) will be getting a mill & generator to run it!

The new farm has transformed their lives, & their husbands or sons have become involved in helping (not typical). In our Jan. newsletter you saw photos of their first harvest; the second planting is done. The women usually make flour from the cured cassava by pounding it, but that wastes some of the product; a mill is more efficient.

So they asked for assistance for a mill & generator to run it, promising to build & maintain a shelter; they have begun making sundried bricks, with the men's help. Besides processing their own harvest, the mill will enable the women to provide a service to others in their village & earn a bit of money for the mill's maintenance.




Teachers presided, including Maman Monique just prior to back surgery. This was successful, to the joy of all, though recovery continues.

Good news, bad news, & big hearts!

There is good news on the national front: President Tshisekedi's new government has just been installed, with concerted attention to reforming corruption. As the new ministers begin work & the many people who have not been paid for a long time begin to receive back pay, we hope & trust that the economy will also experience renewal. Imagine having markets functioning & people able to buy food & other necessities!!!

Meanwhile, the physical weather has been part of the challenge. "Pain" here includes the devastation of torrential rains as well as the effects of years-long economic depression. In March the floods in Kinshasa washed away people & homes; one family lost four children at once. Maman Monique took in two families who had lost everything; trying to feed & reclothe so many has meant that the cupboard has often been nearly bare.

In eastern Congo, around Uvira, the flood destruction has also been severe. Violence goes up & down in this region, but is especially severe in Goma, where Community Charity School is.

Struggling with hunger, flood & homelessness, sickness & deaths of those they love...
